Wyoming Oral History Online Database

This program has been at least three years in the making, and is now available as a downloadable Access database or Excel file through the Society's website at www.wyshs.org. The database lists the details of more than 3,000 oral histories held in two dozen museums and libraries around the state.

From the beginning the goal behind the project has been to make information about the state's extensive oral history collections available to researchers. Entries are searchable by topic, narrator, name, place and time period. Contact information about the holding institutions is also included.

"We now have a better idea of the wealth of oral history in the state of Wyoming—and it's amazing" This is an excellent additional resource for researchers of Wyoming history," said Leslie Waggener, archivist at the American Heritage Center at UW, and current chair of the Society's Oral History Committee. Leslie added that much of the thanks for this project goes to WSHS member Barbara Bogart. Also made possible by grants from the Wyoming State Historical Records Advisory Board and the Wyoming Cultural Trust Fund.
