Society's Constitution Update...

At the upcoming annual meeting in Saratoga the general membership will vote on the following change to the Society's Constitution:

Current constitutional Article IV, Section 1

Section 1: The Society shall meet annually during the weekend in September following Labor Day.

Recommended change for Article IV, Section 1

Section 1: The Society shall meet annually during the weekend in September following Labor Day. The Executive Committee may change the designated date with the approval of two-thirds (2/3) of the board members.

According to the current Constitution and Bylaws, any changes have to be provided to the general membership up to thirty days in advance of the annual meeting. The meeting is scheduled for September 21-23 in Saratoga and the surrounding area. The proposed change has been submitted by the Constitution, Resolution and Bylaws Committee. Members include Patty Myers, chair, Gillette; Robert Melonuk, Fort Laramie and Dave Taylor, Casper.
