RECOMMENDED CONSTITUTION AND BYLAW CHANGES TO BE VOTED ON AT 2016 ANNUAL MEETING

Please note the current language contains strikethrough. The proposed new language is in *italics*.

ARTICLE III: Officers and Governance

- Section 1: The governing body of the Society is the Executive Committee. It shall be composed of nine (9) elected trustees. Trustees must be members of the Wyoming State Historical Society and are elected by the members of the Society. The Executive Committee is empowered to act in all matters pertaining to the Society except as specifically restricted in this constitution and bylaws. The Executive Committee is the Society's governing body. The Executive Committee shall be composed of ten (10 trustees elected by the membership, nine of whom must maintain a primary residence in Wyoming. One (1) trustee must maintain a primary residence of Wyoming. Trustees must be members of the Wyoming State Historical Society. The Executive Committee is empowered to act in all matters pertaining to the Society is governing to the Society is governing. Trustees must be membership, nine of whom must maintain a primary residence outside of Wyoming. Trustees must be members of the Wyoming State Historical Society. The Executive Committee is empowered to act in all matters pertaining to the Society except as specifically restricted in the Constitution and Bylaws.
- Section 3: Five trustees shall serve as at-large members. At least one trustee shall be elected from each of the four geographic regions of the state of Wyoming.

 NE Region = Sheridan, Johnson, Campbell, Crook, Weston

 SE Region = Converse, Niobrara, Platte, Goshen, Laramie, Albany,

 Carbon

 NW Region = Park, Big Horn, Hot Springs, Washakie, Fremont,

 Natrona

SW Region = Teton, Lincoln, Sublette, Uinta, Sweetwater

At large trustees may reside in any part of the state. To qualify for nomination as a regional trustee, a member's principal place of residence must be located within that region.

Of the ten (10) trustees, at least one shall reside in each of Wyoming's four regions (regional trustees).

NE Region = Sheridan, Johnson, Campbell, Crook, Weston

- SE Region = Converse, Niobrara, Platte, Goshen, Laramie, Albany, Carbon
- NW Region = Park, Big Horn, Hot Springs, Washakie, Fremont, Natrona
- SW Region = Teton, Lincoln, Sublette, Uinta, Sweetwater

On the bookshelf



In Memory....

Our condolences to the family of **Ralph Frederick Stahley**, a long-time member from Evanston, and a proud Wyoming veteran, who died on May 7th. Also to the family of **Nanette Ourada**, who died in Cheyenne last December. She and her husband, Thomas, were married for seventy years.

We are also sad to announce the death of WSHS *charter member* Ester Johansson Murray who died in Cody on July 1st. In 2010 she was honored by the Society with the Mabel Brown Cumulative Contribution Award, given in special recognition "to a living Wyoming resident who, over a long period of time, has made valuable contributions to the understanding and awareness of Wyoming and its history." Ester was named a "Living Legend" by Westerners International in 2014, and I know we all agree with that. A beautifully gentle woman, Ester was born in 1919 in Cody. After high school she studied history at the University of Wyoming, receiving her degree in 1941. She taught school for a few years, married and enjoyed traveling, but especially loved returning to her hometown of Cody. She will be remembered for her many books and articles that shared her love of Wyoming. Her works have been widely published in *Wyoming Wildlife* and *Annals of Wyoming*. Ester was an active member of the Park County Historical Society chapter, and served as president and several terms as secretary. In an article from the Buckskin Bulletin she was aptly described as one who "lives life authentically and with honesty, to treat others with kindness and compassion, to write and research with perseverance and passion, to greet each day with spunk and enthusiasm, to approach one's work with dedication, determination and zeal, and to embrace life with spirit and Western gusto....that's true Western grit....that's Ester Johansson Murray."

SW Representative—Alice M. Cornell of Jackson is the retired Head of the University of Cincinnati Libraries Archives & Rare Books Department. She was also editor of the University of Cincinnati Digital Press which produced research publications highlighting Native American and Western materials from multiple institutions. A family vacation brought her to Wyoming in 1957. She wanted to stay, but it was 50 years before she was able to make the move. In the meantime she spent vacations in Wyoming and focused her professional career on the History of the American West. A sabbatical was spent gathering bibliographic resources on the history of Jackson Hole. Work on publications of the University of Cincinnati Digital Press provided opportunities to undertake research and explore, particularly in the Upper Missouri. She is often found behind a camera. From her perspective, "It would

be an honor to be able to use my time, experience and expertise in support of the Wyoming State Historical Society and its projects to develop and enhance access to historical resources in this great state."



SW Representative – Jonita Sommers was raised on a ranch her grandparents, Albert and May McAlister summers homestead in the Big Piney area. She received her BA degree in education from the University of Wyoming, and a Masters Degree in Behavioral Disabilities at the University of Wisconsin at Madison. A retired educator, Jonita taught in Rock Springs and Superior before transferring to Big Piney. For more than twenty-five years she served as a coach for History Day and as district coordinator. In 1994, Jonita published a book on the Green River Drift for which she received an award from the Society. Additionally she has edited several books for Sublette County authors, and written extensive histories for exhibits at the Green River Valley Museum. Her work has also been published in

several magazines. Jonita was instrumental in getting the Sommers Ranch and Green River Drift Trail on the National Register. She and her brother donated the Sommers Ranch to the Sublette County Historical Society so it could become a living history museum.



At Large-Lisa Thalken is a Wyoming Native and a member of the Converse County Historical Society. She is a resident of Douglas and has in the past called both Casper and Wheatland home. She has been involved in many different aspects of history throughout the state for some time and has volunteered as a living historian at multiple sites throughout the state such as Fort Caspar Museum, The National Historic Trails Interpretive Center, The Wyoming Veteran's Memorial Museum, The Historic Bishop Home, Fort Laramie National Historic Site and Fort Fetterman State Historic Site. Aside from her involvement in the historical society, Lisa was recently named chairman of the Friends of Fort Fetterman and also serves on the Douglas Historic Preservation Commission and is actively involved with the ongoing restoration project at Camp Douglas Officers Club. Lisa's passion

is to promote history and the historical society itself to young adults and families and has a goal to see more members her age get involved soon. Rarely does she do any volunteering without being accompanied by her 5 year old daughter Liberty.



At Large—Leslie Waggener is a faculty archivist at the University of Wyoming's American Heritage Center, where she has been employed since 2000. She has held three positions at the AHC: photo archivist, curator of the Alan K. Simpson Institute for Western Politics and Leadership, and, most recently, collections processor and rare books cataloguer. She has taught workshops on photographic materials and on intellectual rights for the Society of American Archivists, and has also conducted workshops in Wyoming and beyond on preservation of photographs and other historical materials. From 2010 through 2012, she led two major oral history projects involving more than 100 interviews relating to Wyoming's recent oil and gas booms and busts. Leslie is co-author of the book *Local History Reference Collections for Public Libraries*, published in 2015 by the American

Library Association. She is a member of the WSHS Oral History Committee. She and her husband, Robert, a Wyoming native, have loved learning about Wyoming's history since her first WSHS trek in 2002. They have attended 14 annual treks together, including this year's venture to the historic Sunrise mine and nearby sites. The couple live in Laramie.
