



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


On the book shelf...





The Jim Gatchell Memorial Museum, in cooperation with the Johnson County Historical Society, the Wyoming State Historical Society and others, is pleased to announce an event about the Johnson County Cattle War, with specific focus on the events that occurred at the historic TA Ranch.

The Johnson County Cattle War was a war between "Cattle Barons" and individual ranchers and homesteaders. It was a struggle for power and survival of the cattle industry in Wyoming, aggravated by complex issues such as the economics of a boom-to-bust cycle, an evolving social order, and devastating weather conditions.

Although there was not a definitive beginning or ending date for the war, the Invasion of Johnson County in April 1892 was the watershed event. The TA Ranch saw a three-day siege where bullets flew and tempers flared before one group was rescued by arrest. In the years following the Invasion, the cattle industry never fully returned to the economic stature achieved during the boom years. In the end, some ranchers diversified by incorporating sheep into their livestock operations. The events of the war have, and continue to impact Wyoming agriculture, economy, and history.


